It seeks to foster international partnerships, mobilize resources from both public and private sectors, and collaborate with multilateral organizations. The ultimate goal of the Alliance is to bolster existing initiatives and encourage new ones to eradicate hunger and extreme poverty by 2030, in alignment with the UN Sustainable Development Goals. Brazil plans to leverage its experience in social protection and poverty reduction to guide the formation of the Global Alliance and ensure its effectiveness on a global scale.

As we look to implement the goals of the Global Alliance and further G20 outcomes, there are vast opportunities for Japanese firms to contribute to and benefit from initiatives in Brazil and other emerging markets. By investing in sustainable projects and promoting collaboration, Japanese companies can play a crucial role in shaping a more equitable and sustainable future. We welcome your partnership in this journey toward a world of shared prosperity.

In this context, I would like to extend a special invitation to Japanese companies and investors to engage with Brazil towards the attainment of these global goals. Japan and Brazil have been strong partners, sharing common values of sustainable development, innovation, and inclusive growth, not to mention the unique human bonds linking our peoples.
